The PCC was elected at the APCM in April 2012 and has met 6 times. Each member serves for 3 years after which time they can put themselves up for re-election; this means there is a good turn-over of members bringing new ideas, energy and enthusiasm. Meetings take place in the narthex or the balcony room; we start promptly at 7.45 pm and tea, coffee and biscuits keep us going. We always finish by 10.00 pm.

Our agenda covers all aspects of life at St Mary's. Reports are made by the various committees – Buildings & Finance, Chancel restoration and Lettings - and we are brought up to date with the Deanery Synod and Churches Together by our representatives.

This year, as before, there has been much discussion about building and maintenance. Our Safeguarding Officer and Electoral Roll Officer keep us informed of news and changes and it is always good to hear local news from Wilma, especially the strong links being built with local schools.

CHURCHWARDEN'S REPORT: FABRIC AND ORNAMENTS 2013

Martin and I are now in our third year of working together and church life this year has been much like any other.

Some jobs are urgent and some are less urgent. Many revolve around toilets and light bulbs. We seem to have an arrangement. Martin does the light bulbs.

This year we have replaced a soil gasket in the old disabled toilet and fitted a new seat in the gents cubicle. We have replaced the flush handle and valve in the narthex toilet and this now functions fairly well.

It is no longer possible to get locked in the narthex toilet and it is no longer possible to get locked in the corridor outside the other toilets. Such glamour.

Following a health and hygiene inspection we will be replacing the hand towels in the narthex toilet and in the upstairs toilets with paper towels and providing hooks on the doors.

Water ingress is still a major problem especially over the south Porch and in the Baptistery. This is still in hand and as we have a Quinquennial Inspection this year our architect is fully aware of these problems and hopefully they will be dealt with as part of a larger repair programme.

On a happier note, the silver candlesticks on the high Altar have been fully restored and with the improved lighting they positively 'glow'.

During the year the organ console was resited making the chancel far more practical for the dignity of the choir moving in and out of this area.

At this important meeting I would like to acknowledge the debt of gratitude we owe to each other:

- to those who beautify our worship – our choir, organists and servers, our sacristans, our sidespeople, our flower arrangers, our cleaners;
- to those who work with our children and young people, through Junior Church, Junior Choir and Mary's Little Lambs;
- to the countless helpers who deliver postcards at Easter and Christmas; to the concert helpers;
- to our Parochial Church Council who share decision-making on behalf of St Mary's, to Sarah who is a wonderful and wise PCC secretary and will be hard to replace;
- to the finance team, led by Keith, for ensuring we live within our means.
- to Pat who ensures all our lets pay on time and are happy with the space they use, and who in addition to all that does most of the church's photocopying;

All of these people are volunteers.

St Mary's employs 2 people. They deserve our gratitude too for what they give to the Parish and for going way beyond their contractual obligations:

- to David, who provides us wonderful leadership in music and who tirelessly gives of himself so that we have a choir which not only sings well, but which knows that it is loved and valued
- to Nicky, who keeps the public parts of this church which are used by many looking spotless;

- Martin and Keith have given and given of themselves over the past year. Often their work is unseen and behind the scenes. Usually their work is tedious and unexciting – wrestling with architects and insurance companies. St Mary's could not exist without the work they do.

sure and also challenge. St Mary's has been blessed as we have recognised that within our congregation there is a wide range of theological and political conviction.

This isn't always comfortable. The blessings we have received have come, not from trying to be all things to all people, but by valuing our differences and sometimes that is difficult.

The second calling we have is to be of service. Often unseen by most of us on Sunday mornings, people serve beyond the confines of the worshipping congregation: the Around the Table Men's group, Mary's Little Lambs, the gardeners, the concert support group, all welcome and reach out to people. And they do this not 'to try to get people into Church', but simply because they value people.

There are individuals too who serve the wider community in the name of St Mary's: our School Governors, the leaders of 5th Balham Brownies and Guides. There are people such as our Safeguarding Officers who help us fulfil our duty of care to all, but most especially to the most vulnerable people. We shouldn't forget either the service we give at a distance, as it were: our commitment to Fairtrade generally; the yearly involvement with Christian Aid Week; the Box on the High Road.

In all these ways we seek to live out our vocation to be a Parish Church. We do that in the knowledge that we are loved by God, and that knowledge is sustained by the worship we share. The worship of God is our core activity. From that worship flows our calling to witness and to serve.

Each one of us plays our part in our life together; some are able at the moment to do more than others.

We have reached our target for the Green Memorial Altar Frontal and are in the process of design and manufacture although it is not too late to add names and contribute to this project if you still wish. Sadly, just recently, we have a break-in and we lost four windows; one in the meter cupboard in the porch, one in the narthex (not the painted glass thankfully), one in the porch door to the stairs and one in the parish office. No access was made into the office and the miscreant left empty handed.

As I write, just after Easter Day, we no longer have a bell rope (doesn't anything last longer than 25 years these days?) and the organ doesn't work. Here we go again!

Building and Finance Committee

The Building and Finance Committee is a sub-committee of the PCC which deals with the day to day matters of maintaining the building and finances on behalf of the PCC.

Building

Throughout the year we have continued to monitor our 'regular' contracts for gas, electricity, water, telephones, broadband, insurance, fire extinguishers, fire alarms, boilers, sound system, timber floor polishing and lift, seeking to ensure we comply with legislation and keep the building safe for all to use in a cost effective way. In addition we have a programme of working through our quinquennial building report undertaking the works identified as required. A new quinquennial inspection is due in 2013.

We have undertaken work of a 'routine' nature throughout the year including:

monitoring and attempting to solve damp ingress at places within the building.

- The Chapel Dome: the repair undertaken in 2011 has not worked and when persistently wet (like much of last summer) the rain comes in again. We have asked our architect to investigate and see if there is an 'easy' solution.
- Damp to the porch and family chapel. This is proving problematic. We have previously undertaken rainwater pipe repairs and some associated brickwork repairs. This has not eased the damp so we have appointed our architect to assist us in resolving this on-going problem. Hopefully progress will be made this year.

Previously damp in the narthex toilet: We have made adjustments to the external rain water pipe and it seems that this has been successful. This area is now available for repainting.

The tower staircase walls and ceiling have been re-plastered and is now ready for repainting.

Following the replacement of the two lead roofs stolen in 2011 and replaced early 2012 a significant amount of damp had penetrated into the entrance porch and staircase areas. We have been letting these areas dry out before undertaking re-decoration, particularly for the staircase. These are now dry enough for repainting.

We had identified a leak on the incoming water main which has been repaired.

Annual maintenance tasks such as unblocking toilets, drains and gutters have been on-going.

A separate committee has now been formed to manage the chancel restoration.

Finance

The main audited finance report for the year to 31 December 2012 is available elsewhere.

The finance team is now working well with a dedicated group dealing with weekly matters such as paying bills out and monies into the bank

Vicar's Report to the Annual Parochial Church Meeting 2013

In the Church of England's understanding, the purpose of a Parish Church is to be there for everyone who lives in the Parish (and of course for those who live beyond and who choose to make it their own). This is the Anglican way of affirming God's love for a hugely diverse group of people; people who have little more in common than the area in which they live. St Mary's is called to be Church for everyone who lives here in two ways.

Firstly, we are called to be a place, a congregation, a focus of Christian worship and prayer which is open to all. No-one is to be intentionally excluded. Second, we are called to be of service to all who live here. We are called to do that as a sign of God's love for them, without any agenda or advantage of our own.

There are encouraging signs that, by God's grace, we continue to move in positive directions.

St Mary's has been enriched by welcoming people from other Christian traditions: through Churches Together in Balham and Upper Tooting, through being a place where people in reader training can come for placements, and through working more closely together with churches in our area. St Mary's has also been enriched by holding links with the South London Refugee Network, by our continued involvement in the Balham Town Centre Partnership, by our links with many local schools and by offering our building as a place for concerts for our local community.

St Mary's has been blessed by the presence of people who are getting older, through Golden Years, through the Holiday @ Home project, through faithful attendance at services. St Mary's has been blessed because we have cherished our younger people, through Junior Church, the trial Summer Holiday Club, Mary's Little Lambs and our work with Trinity St Mary's School. St Mary's has been blessed as we have offered ways of worshipping which both reas-

We began 2012 with a planned budget deficit in part because of the need to fund the roofing works, and with concerns that our income may fall. We are delighted to reach the end of the financial year in a healthier state than anticipated. We are well aware that this happy state of affairs is not typical as a large number of parishes that have struggled financially in the past few years. As the work to resolve the damp issues falls into the current financial year we are again expecting to have a budget deficit for the year, however the early signs of 2013 suggest that your continued support may make this less painful than anticipated.

On behalf of the Building and Finance Committee I wholeheartedly thank you for your continued generosity.

Chancel Restoration report 2013

Only 18 months ago, the first meetings were held to consider what was required to restore the Chancel and how much money and how that might be raised.

The formal launch was on Saturday 3 March 2012 with a concert by Chromata, taking the choice of works from the mosaics of the Chancel.

We have been raising the money with other concerts, events and individual donations - including 4 in excess of £1000 each; we are very grateful for all donations to this appeal.

With a small sum left over from the earlier works, we already have over £20,000 for this new phase of the overall restoration of St Marys church building after the 1998 fire.

Activity has slowed though and the new PCC will be looking at taking this forward - confirming the specification of works, updating the estimates of cost and making applications for grants.

The website report for this year's APCM

The St Mary's website has had a major redesign in the last year to help the church better communicate notices, services, events and other information to the parish and Balham's local community. The redesign also involved the website being hosted by a new company, Linode.com, as there had been issues with the previous host's reliability and support.

The new website can be far more easily updated, meaning the site can expand much easier over time as required. The main focus of the home page is now on the latest news: with notices, Twitter and Facebook taking centre stage. A What's On box shows all the public services and church events that anyone can attend in the next 7 days, as well as a link to a full monthly calendar with all public Church and other events happening over the next three months. The home page is very fresh, with new information being posted every couple of days.

The room hire booking system has also been redesigned from the ground up to make managing the church's bookings as easy as possible. The new system uses Google Calendar to keep track of bookings, with the website only showing publicly available events - a very similar setup to the previous system, but with a lot less hassle.

STEWARDS REPORT APRIL 2013

Southwark Pastoral Auxiliary report

I continue to share my pastoral work between St Mary's and Brixton Prison.

The prison caters for every religion so that whatever faith the inmate requires there is always some one there to meet their religious needs.

My role in the prison remains the same, that is visiting the men who are vulnerable eg those who are suicidal, self harm, drug abusers, or have mental health issues.

Most of my work in the Prison entails meeting and chatting with the inmates discussing issues that concern them such as family problems, their fears, anxieties, frustrations, also the difficulty with being locked up, sometimes the discussions can be quite challenging especially when it comes to religious issues.

As SPA of St Mary's, I visit housebound people, visit people in hospital and take Communion to those who request it. Together with the Ministry Team we share in pastoral care for all those who live in our parish.

My role as a SPA, both at Brixton Prison and at St Mary's is to be supportive compassionate and caring, not to judge and to always remember that GOD our heavenly father is a God of love and forgiveness and that he loves us all regardless of who or what we are, and that through Prayer he will give us the comfort strength and support that we need in difficult times.

Director of Music

As ever, this has been a busy year for those involved in leading the music at St Mary's, and I'd like to thank all those who so generously give their time and talents, organists, conductors and singers, and for the support of Mtr Wilma and the Ministry Team.

We've seen significant developments during the year, but also faced more than once the frustration of moving one step forward and one backwards. A lot of time and effort was put into recruiting the beginnings of a Junior Choir from TSM. For a time we had six young recruits. But it proved difficult to secure the continuing commitment of the children's parents to get them to church week by week. Without an ongoing core of children in the choir, it is hard to attract and retain new recruits, as there is no sense of a "club". We will need to try again this year, perhaps focussing more on the children of our own congregation rather than on TSM children without a current link to the church.

Among the adult choir too, we were active in recruitment and for a time it looked like we might fill the choir stalls. But relatively few of the several expressions of interest turned into bums on seats, and some new members have had to step back for perfectly understandable personal reasons. In terms of numbers, we end the year much as we began, with the same core of loyal singers but without the security that comes from a group of strong confident voices in each section.

I look forward to more of those who consider joining the choir following through on that good intention, and for my part will try to do more to make it easy for them to join. Otherwise, the choir has continued to develop steadily and find its own distinctive voice and style. Our general approach has been to find the right music to fit the choir that we actually have, and perform it sincerely and to the best of our ability. In some cases, this has meant composing or arranging music which is specifically tailored for the resources available to us. Within this approach, there is room to challenge. The services of Holy Week, including a great deal of unaccompanied plainsong and choral music, provided ample examples that the choir is prepared to rise to such a challenge and to lead with

Tooting Deanery Synod 2011-2012

St Mary's lay member representatives for Tooting Deanery Synod are Alex Russell, Chris Serbutt and Victoria Gregory. This APCM marks the end of our second year of a three year term.

The Deanery Synod met three times this year: 26th June 2012, 16th October 2012 and 12th March 2013. At each meeting there was a presentation from a speaker and then news of each other's parishes was shared. At the June 2012 and March 2013 meetings clergy and lay members were opted on to Diocesan Synod including our very own Rev Mtr Wilma and Alex Russell.

June 2012 Meeting

There was a presentation on growing older and the world perspective on older people in our society. A panel of gave their comments on the findings of questionnaire that was put to older people in deanery churches which included:

- pastoral care for older people should not make assumption that older people are spiritually settled, they need support too.
- giving people opportunities to tell their stories, to be heard.
- work on inter-generational contact.
- not to forget the past.

October 2012 Meeting

The Chaplain of HMP Wandsworth gave a presentation highlighting that, despite of its forbidding appearance and strict discipline, God is found there and in other prisons like Wandsworth.

He explained the prison profile, a restorative justice initiative and the challenges of bringing meaning into the lives of prisoners through religion or faith. The role of the Chaplain and the Christian call to this particular ministry being found in:

- We are all made in the image of God
- We all have sinned.
- Christ ministry to the outcast
- Repentance, forgiveness and restoration
- Love and honesty
- Right living to God in the community
- Protection of the vulnerable –especially children and vulnerable adults

March 2013 Meeting

A presentation was given by the Area Dean of Lambeth South about the outcome of the Signs of Growth questionnaire that completed by the congregations of Deanery members. The feedback was positive showing that people are growing in faith but that more work needs to be undertaken to support young boys to engage and to provide more spiritual support to older people.

5th Balham Brownies & Guides Annual Report 2013

I am pleased to report that both these units are now fully subscribed with 24 Brownies and 24 Guides. We also have 2 new Assistant Guiders, Karen helping with Brownies and Helen with Guides.

The Brownies have continued to work on badges including Hostess, Friend to Animals and Agility. We also hosted the District Brownie Adventure Day and were delighted that Mtr Wilma joined us to sing songs from around the UK.

To celebrate the Jubilee, Guides and Brownies joined together for a party and Crown Competition and Mtr Eileen had the difficult job of judging.

The Guides have followed a very varied programme. Apart from knitting, cooking pancakes on baked bean tins, lighting fires, shopping on a budget and camping they have also had the challenge of Master Chef where each patrol has had to work together to produce a starter – humous, and a pudding – lemon and orange mousse. Each was judged on taste, presentation and the state of their work station!

At the end of the summer term they visited an Ice Cream Parlour for a special treat.

The Guides and Brownies have continued to do secret cleans of the church, deliver Christian Aid envelopes enabling us to raise over £1500 for this annual charity and take part in the very important Remembrance Service.

Guides once again raised over £100 for Crisis by making over 300 mince pies.

Most recently both units supported Comic Relief by holding a sponsored silence. The Brownies had to make paper planes, ice biscuits, blow bubbles and use chopsticks, whilst the Guides worked together to make a 1000 piece jigsaw puzzle. Jointly they raised £468.

- **NEW:**

The Diocese recently implemented “A Safeguarding Self Audit for Parish Safeguarding Policies and Procedures 2012-2013.

The above came into effect following a pilot scheme conducted by Jill Sandham , Diocesan Safeguarding Adviser and a working (Reference Group) across a range of Parishes.

The Audit comprised of eight pages of questions taken from various sections of ‘A Safe Church Manual’, for completion between January and March 2013.

The questionnaire related as to whether we had met the criteria wholly, partially, not at all or not applicable and were colour coded.

The Audit was carried out on Wednesday 27th February 2013 by Mtr. Wilma, church wardens Martin and Keith and Elaine. The findings / results were discussed at PCC on Wednesday 20th March 2013 for acceptance and to agree Safeguarding Action Plan for the following year, with clarity about who will take responsibility and with target dates.

Our overall scores were quite good.

Green - criteria wholly met	=	21 points
Amber - partially met	=	8
Red - not met at all	=	1
N/A -	=	3

All documents relating to the Audit and the table of scores form were to be received by the Diocese no later than the 31 March 2013. The Church Wardens will be required to answer questions on the progress of the Audit in the Archdeacons’ Articles of Enquiry.

Finally, a big thank you to Mtr. Wilma, Martin and Keith for the time spent completing the Audit. Well done.

Not forgetting all Junior Church Leaders and Helpers for the excellent work you do with the children, those supporting David and the Stewards who prepare the crèche area every Sunday morning.

The Junior Church leaders and helpers continue to ensure registration forms are completed by parents of children attending Junior Church at the beginning of the school term (September).

- Risk Assessments:

Risk Assessments for Junior Church are due to be reviewed in April. Elaine will arrange meeting with junior church leaders and helpers.

Risk Assessments for the crèche area are due to be re-visited by Suzanne and myself by the end of April. The number of children playing in this area has increased over the last year and additional safety notices need to be in place.

Risk Assessments to be carried out on the area used by 'Mary's Little Lambs'. Elaine will work with parents identifying risks.

It is vital we complete the above to the best of our ability, since the PCC is responsible for ensuring the Parish's Insurance provides adequate cover in the event of something going wrong.

- Changes to CRB:

The Disclosure & Barring Service Forms replaced the Criminal Records Bureau forms (CRB) from January 2013. There is no change in the colour of the form which is still purple, except a logo above its title in the top right hand corner.

In March 2013, we processed one new application and one renewal using the new forms. Both applicants have received their disclosure number and will offer support to David with junior music club. Another applicant is awaiting her disclosure number. A further two are due for renewal this month.
